100 Years of Federal Roads July 1916 – July 2016

The groundwork for our modern system of roads was laid 100 years ago this month. Horse and buggies, wagons, bicycles and people traveled paths that some people called roads. These roads had large ruts and were washed out or became mud bogs whenever it rained. With the increase in automobiles in the early 1900's better roads were needed. A driving force was the Post Office who needed good rural roads to drive on to get the mail delivered. The government and the states fought over who should be responsible.

President Woodrow Wilson made a commitment to get the roads in the U.S. improved as part of his party's platform and re-election campaign in 1916. When the Federal Aid Road Act bill came to his desk for his signature on July 11, 1916, he signed it into law. This bill provided funding for the improvement of any rural road over which the U.S. mail was carried. The government was trying to figure out how to divide up the government and the state costs. A key feature of the legislation was the requirement that the states must have a highway department. Regrettably, with the U.S. getting involved with WW1 in Europe in 1918 no major roadwork was started.

A second bill, the Federal Highway Act of 1921, was later passed into law. This 1921 bill along with the Post Office Appropriations Act of 1922, provided a multi-year plan of federal funding for the roadwork. Many of the nation's highways remained unpaved until the 1930's. This partnership of the federal and state governments was supported by the multi-year authorization bill. Also, the annual appropriations were essential to a continuous Federal-aid Highway Program that is still here today.

Restoration Projects

Model A Ford Repair & Restoration

Tire & Tube change outs

This is the first of a series of articles about the Repair & Replacement of parts on the Model a Ford. This article is about how to remove and replace/repair a TUBE that has gotten a hole in it and/or the TIRE that is worn out per the Ford way. Many of the roads driven on during the 1928-31 time frame were dirt roads and the paved roads were not as well maintained as they are today.

The quick fix would be to simply remove the flat tire/wheel from the vehicle and install the spare tire, but this only works if the spare is aired up and ready for installation. Many owners today have their tires maintained in a Tire Dealers shop or have a Tire Changing stand in their own shop.

The Ford way – The tire which is flat can be removed, repaired/replaced with the wheel installed on the vehicle.

TIRE REMOVAL -

1. Jack the vehicle up and off the ground.
2. Push the TIRE in on both sides towards the dropped center area of the RIM.
3. Align the TUBE valve stem such that it will not be pinched in the following step.
4. Using the Tire Iron (spoon) pry the TIRE outside bead over the outside of the RIM.
5. Remove the TUBE from inside of the TIRE.
6. Using the Tire Iron (spoon) pry the TIRE inside bead over the outside of the RIM.

TUBE REPAIR/REPLACEMENT –

1. Air up the TUBE and check for holes/leaks.
2. Deflate the TUBE and patch any holes using a hot or cold tire tube patching kit.
3. Repeat steps 1 and 2 as needed.
4. Deflate the TUBE.

TIRE INSTALLATION –

1. Place the lower, back side of the TIRE into the dropped center area of the RIM.
2. Using the Tire Iron (spoon) pry the TIRE inside bead over the outside of the RIM.
3. Carefully install the repaired/new TUBE inside of the TIRE.
4. Align the valve stem to the hole in the RIM and put it through the hole.
5. Slightly inflate the TUBE.
6. Align the TUBE valve stem such that it will not be pinched in the following step.
7. Place the lower, outside side of the TIRE into the dropped center area of the RIM.
8. Using the Tire Iron (spoon) pry the TIRE outside bead over the outside of the RIM.
9. Inflate the TUBE to 35 PSI.
10. Let the TIRE back down onto the ground and remove the Jack.

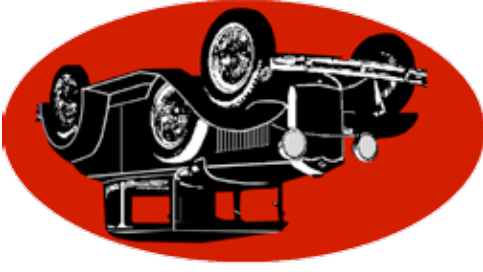
