Restoration Projects

Different Chassis Parts

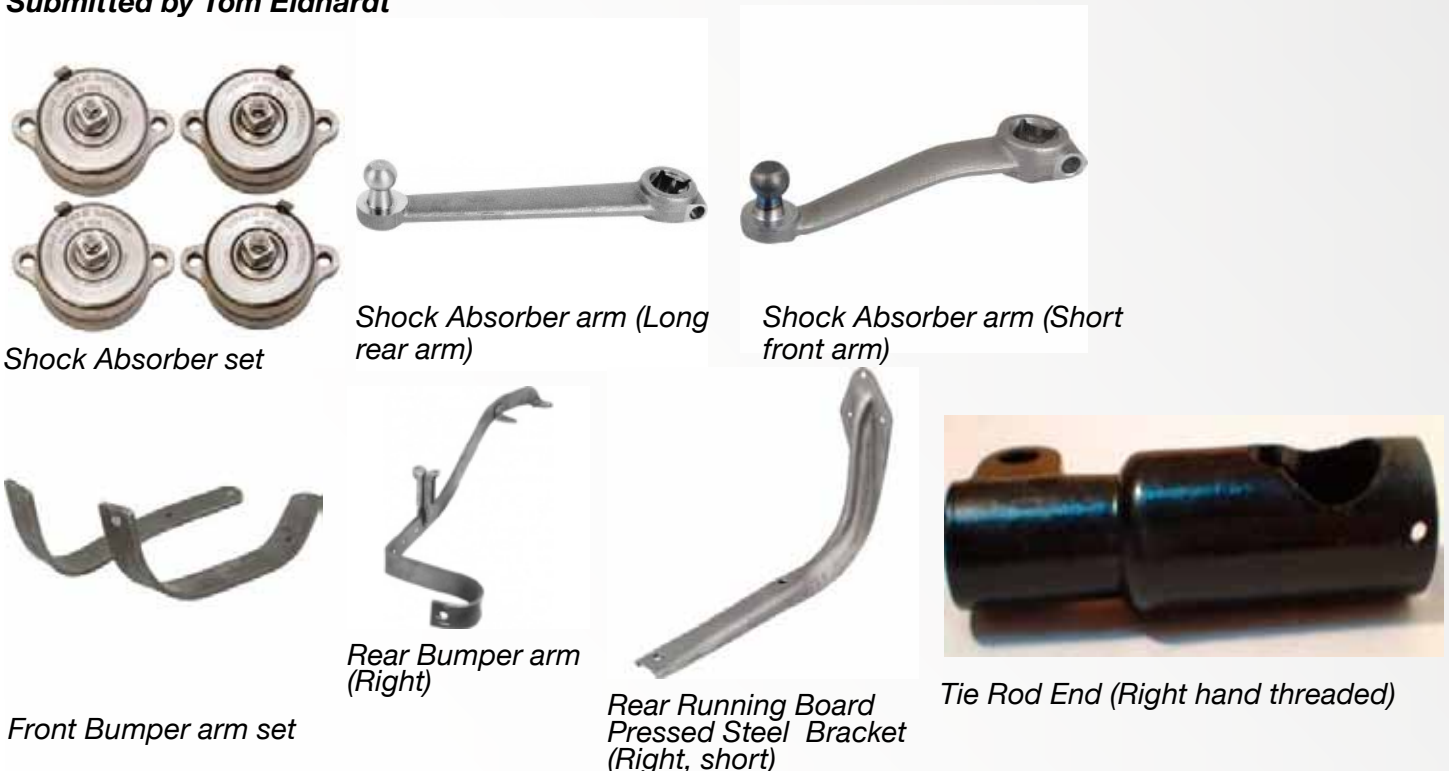
This article (Part 2 of 2) was written to identify those Chassis parts which have a similar, but opposite side part that can only be installed in a specific location. During a restoration project finding the correct part can be a challenge when obtaining a part from a fellow club member or when rummaging through the boxes of parts at a Swap Meet. There are also differences in some parts on the 1928-29 and the 1930-31 cars.

In designing the Model A Ford the idea of making one part that could be used on either the Left or Right side or used in either the Front or Rear created a cost savings. The Front Axle is an example whereas it can be mounted with either end being the Left or Right side. Other examples include the Front Axle Spring Perches, Front Spindles, Front Brake shoes, Rear Brake shoes, Service Brake Rods, Emergency Brake Rods, Bumper Bars, Wheel Rims, etc. The difference in Fenders, Running Boards and Bodies are not being addressed in this article.

The following is a list of 6 of the Cchassis parts you may need to get that are different:

1. Shock Absorbers – The two kinds are CW (Clockwise) mounted on the Right Front or Left Rear side and AC (Anti-Clockwise) mounted on the Left Front or Right Rear side.
2. Shock Absorber arms – Short arms used on the Front and Long arms used on the Rear.
3. Front Bumper arms – Right side and Left side arms.
4. Rear Bumper arms – Right side and Left side arms. NOTE: The height and location of the Standoff bracket on the Arm determines which body it fits. New holes can be drilled into the arms and body correct Standoff brackets can be installed, as needed. The 3" Standoffs are found on 1928-29 Sedans & 1928-31 Phaetons. The 4-1/2" Standoffs are found on 1930-31 Sedans. The 5" Standoffs are found on 28-31 Coupes and Roadsters.
5. Running Board Brackets - Right Rear side and Left Rear side. NOTE: The longer Front Brackets are the same length. The shorter Rear Brackets are different, i.e., bent different.
6. Tie Rod Ends – The Tie Rod has ends that are Right hand threaded and Left hand threaded. NOTE: If you mount the Tie Rod backwards then rotating the rod to adjust for proper "Toe-In" will be backwards.

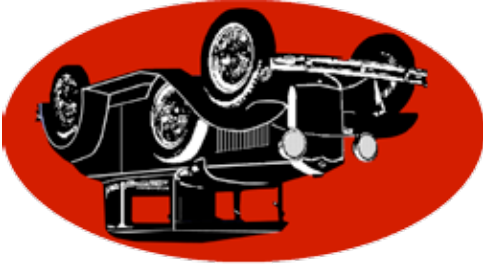
Projects:
