The four Model "A"s belonging to Janet and Rick, Teri and Dean, Tom and Mara and Jan looked just perfect parked right in front of the church entrance with Budzeck's and Hinkson's signs identifying John and Walteen as the previous owners. I'm sure John was up there smiling down on that scene.

My special memory of John was he always looked me straight in the eye and said "you stay out of trouble now" and then came a big smile. Our club's special memories of John are many and happy too. In closing, I'm sure you know Walteen we love you, we are there for you and you are in our thoughts and prayers.

In Memory: John Corson



John Corson, pictured above with his wife Walteen, passed away on Tuesday, September 19th. John's memorial service was held Friday, September 29th, in Richland, Washington. A reception was held after the memorial. As is the custom of the club, Model A members drove their A's to the funeral to honor both John and Walteen. Two of the cars were previously owned by the Corsons.

In an interview for the club's newsletter in February 2000, we learned John arrived in the Tri-Cities in 1943. He worked for DuPont as an automotive maintenance shop foreman. A few years later, he and Walteen met each other and began farming in the Columbia Basin. Wheat, corn and potatoes were the main crops. John enjoyed working with wood and built several projects such as playhouses, a John Deere bedframe, and a ferris wheel for his grandchildren.

He also had a large interest in old cars and was always willing and eager to teach and share his knowledge of Model A's. John was a member of the Columbia Basin Model A Club for many years and will be missed by club and community members.

Restoration Projects

Model A Ford Repair & Restoration – Main Wiring Harness

Having problems with electrical components not working correctly? The problem may be either the component, loose wiring connections or the wire(s) in the associated wiring harness. This article will address the wire connections and wires in the wiring harness. There is one Main wiring harness and several sub-wiring wires and harnesses. Wiring harnesses are held to the vehicle frame with Frame Rail clips or brackets and to the engine block with a bracket. Wires will have either ring terminals or bullet end terminals for making connections. Single wire wiring and Multiple wiring harnesses will be covered in future articles.

Main wiring harness

It contains wires that run from the Light Switch Body to the Headlight buckets, Horn, Generator, Stop Light switch and to the Taillights. Vehicles with Cowl Lights also have additional wires in the harness for connection to the Cowl Light crossover wiring harness.

Tools Needed: Flat blade screw driver.

Parts Needed: Wiring harness (as needed).

CAUTION: The Battery cable or the Safety Fuse should be pulled during wire/wiring removal and replacement to prevent shorting wires to ground. Note color and their location/position of wires during removal and reinstallation.

Main Wiring Harness Removal/Replacement:

VERIFY that the Battery cable is disconnected or the Safety Fuse was pulled.
DISCONNECT wiring harness at Left Headlight bucket and pull out of the flex conduit.
DISCONNECT wiring harness at Right Headlight bucket and pull out of the flex conduit.
RELEASE wiring to Right Headlight from two clips at bottom/back of Radiator.
DISCONNECT Yellow wire at Horn.
DISCONNECT Blue w/Yellow tracer wire at Horn and pull wires out of the flex conduit.
DISCONNECT Yellow wires (2 wires w/common lug) at Generator Cut Out terminal.
REMOVE Frame wiring harness bracket near Generator.
DISCONNECT Black wire at the Taillight. (Running light wire)
DISCONNECT Green wire at the Taillight. (Stop light wire)
REMOVE Frame Rail clips/brackets from Taillights forward on frame.
DISCONNECT both Green wires ran to the Stop Light Switch.
REMOVE the Light Switch body located at the bottom of the Steering Column.
PULL wiring harness out of the Light Switch body.
REPLACE wiring harness in reverse step order from above.

Final Job wrap up:

Make sure that all wiring connections are tight and that the Frame Rail wire clips and brackets have been properly installed to prevent chafing of wires.

Old Business: Jan mentioned he would like members to contact him if you haven't already had your picture taken for next year's calendar.

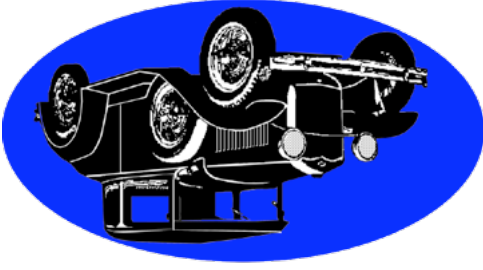
New Business: Jan circulated a list he put together of members expertise in particular repair categories and asked those present to look at the list and either add or delete their name where they felt they could help.
